

**Global Diagram 5. The rise of global Christianity across the 20th century showing the rise of global Independency out of global denominationalism, AD 1900-2025.**

The rise and growth of global Independency is shown in the globes below covering the years 1900, 1970, 2000, and 2025 assuming current trends continue. Vertical slices represent the 6 megablocs (Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Anglican, Protestant, Independent, marginal Christian). The light grey balloon from 1970 to 2025 represents the size and ecclesiastical location of the whole Pentecostal/Charismatic/Neoevangelical Renewal in the Holy Spirit.

The table then analyzes the 6 totals for global Christianity shown at center below the globes. It does it for the year 1970, shown throughout by all numbers in light type. It does the same for the year AD 2000, shown throughout by all numbers in **black** type. This results in 91 pairs of figures

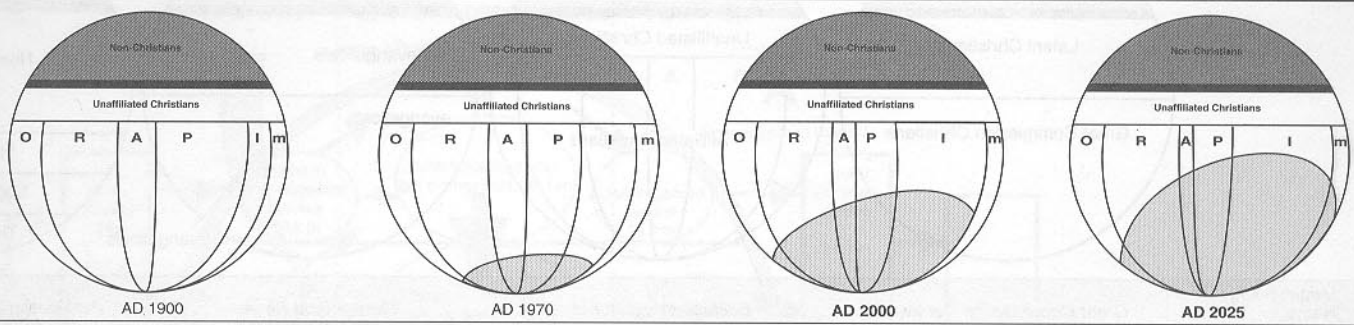
showing AD 1970-2000 trends. Next, the table dichotomizes the whole of Christianity into the *denominationalist* world (Christians organized into the 5 historic megablocs; shown in the lefthand half of the table), and the *postdenominationalist* world (the more recent Independent megabloc that rejects historic denominationalism; shown in the righthand half of the table). This results in 88 denominationalist/postdenominationalist comparisons.

Large-size percentage numbers are meant primarily to be compared horizontally (% meaning percent of each's global total at top). Small-size percentage numbers are meant primarily to be compared vertically (% meaning percent of nearest large-size number above each).

The table then gives 176 numbers which, when read horizontally analyze Christianity into 88 dichotomous pairs or parallels between the 1970 situation and the AD 2000 situation. These numbers can also be read vertically as 72 vertical comparisons arranged in 8 vertical trichotomies followed by 64 vertical dichotomies.

The bottom 5 lines enumerate the 3 Waves of the Pentecostal/Charismatic/Neoevangelical Renewal by means of 40 different numbers. The first of these 5 lines gives 8 figures enumerating the whole Renewal (First and Second Waves on the left, Third Wave on the right). The following 2 pairs of 2 lines each analyze the Renewal in 16 horizontal dichotomies and 16 vertical dichotomies.
